Team Presidency in Davos, supporting our President, Ministers and business leaders

Team South Africa on Saturday 23 January 2016 concluded a successful programme at the 2016 World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland. President Zuma, led a high powered Team South Africa delegation and delivered the message that South Africa is open for business to global investors and other stakeholders.

South Africa reiterated that the National Development Plan, the 9 point plan for economic recovery and Operation Phakisa were being implemented with a view to ensuring economic and social growth and development. The current global economic challenges require South Africa to develop a robust and responsive set of measures to ensure economic stability.

With particular reference to the theme of Davos 2016, Mastering the 4th Industrial Revolution, Team South Africa emphasised the need to create a balance between the use of technology to mechanise and industrialise to move the economy into a knowledge state of human development and job security.

The overwhelming sentiment emanating from Davos was that investors continue to see South Africa as a preferred investment destination. The fact the multinationals – amongst others, Mercedes Benz, BMW, Johnston and Johnston, Marriot Hotels - continue to invest in the country is indicative of this positive sentiment. In addition, many countries around the world are faced with similar challenges of slowing economic growth, falling commodity and oil prices. Davos 2016 presented Team South Africa with an opportunity to discuss these challenges, global responses and best practices.

In the last week, ICICI Bank of India announced it would establish an office in South Africa.

Minister Davies said that "We're telling investors that - despite our country's enormous challenges,

many due to global shocks – we are resilient." It is also significant that according to the Oxford Business Group "foreign investors are often less pessimistic about South Africa than many South African companies are."

Opening ceremony of TAPI pipeline



Turkmenistan hosted the launch ceremony of TAPI which took place on Sunday 13 December 2015

The TAPI (Turkmenistan-Afghanistan-Pakistan-India gas pipeline) launch ceremony was led jointly by President Gurbanguly Berdymuhamedov of Turkmenistan, President Ashraf Ghani of Afghanistan, Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif of Pakistan and Vice President Hamid Ansari of India.

The ceremony that was held some 25 km east of Mary city on 13 December 2015 would not have happened without Turkmenistan going out of its way to create concord among the participating countries and voluntarily taking the maximum load of the project.

It must be underlined that Turkmenistan never treated TAPI as merely a commercial project: There was always the declared intention to use the natural resources of Turkmenistan to promote peace, stability and prosperity in the entire region. And, these were not mere words --- Together with the TAPI launch ceremony, there was the start of phase III of the development of Galkynysh gas field, where a consortium of the Japanese and Turkish companies will develop the capacity to produce and purify 33 billion cubic meters of gas annually to feed TAPI.

The financial commitment of Turkmenistan toward TAPI is impressive --- the phase III of Galkynysh will cost nearly US \$ 3-5 billion and in addition Turkmenistan, as TAPI consortium leader, will bear 51% of the project cost. This is in line with the Turkmen way of doing things that words should be fully backed by deeds.

Lifting of sanctions on Iran



South Africa welcomes the announcement that Iran has fulfilled all of its initial commitments under the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action nuclear deal, resulting in the immediate lifting of all United States and European Union nuclear-related sanctions on Iran.

This achievement is a shining example that proves that negotiation and dialogue is the only way to find sustainable solutions to international conflicts. South Africa hopes that the spirit of cooperation and concord shown in reaching the Iran nuclear deal will be carried-over to settling other conflicts globally.

South Africa believes that the world should build on the momentum generated by the Iran nuclear deal to make progress on nuclear disarmament, as well as the establishment of the Middle East Zone Free of Nuclear Weapons and all other Weapons of Mass Destruction.

The South African government fully supports trade and investment with Iran and has been working hard to revive economic ties with Iran, which is one of the biggest and richest consumer markets in the Middle East. We strongly encourage South African businesses to take advantage of the enormous opportunities that will arise from the lifting of sanctions.

AU Summit



President of the Republic of South Africa, H.E. Mr. Jacob G. Zuma

H.E. President Jacob Zuma led a South African delegation to the 26th Ordinary Session of the Assembly of the African Union, held on 30 and 31 January 2016 in Addis Ababa. The Summit took place under the theme: "2016, African Year of Human Rights with a particular focus on Women Rights."

The year 2016, marks important milestones in the continental and global women's agenda for gender equality and women empowerment. Continentally, it is the 30th anniversary of the coming into force of the African Charter on Human and People's Rights in 1986 and the beginning of the second phase of the African Women's Decade 2010-2020.

The African Women's Decade is the AU's implementation framework which aims to advance gender equality and the empowerment of women. Among the major issues of focus that the Summit was looking at were:

- · the status of peace and security in Africa,
- · financing of the Union,
- · governance.
- · elections and constitutionalism, as well as
- · the implementation of NEPAD projects and the African Peer Review Mechanism.

SIX AFRICAN FEMALE WRITERS WHO IN-FLUENCED CHANGE



EMMA MASHININI (born 21 August 1929) is a South African trade unionist and political leader. Living in Johannesburg, her family was forcibly displaced several times during her childhood. She was active with the African National Congress (ANC) in 1956. She was arrested and detained without charges for six months in 1981–82. Mashinini played several important roles in the transition to ANC rule in the 1980s and 1990s.



WANGARI MUTA MAATHAI (1 April 1940 – 25 September 2011) was a Kenyan environmental and political activist. In the 1970s. Maathai founded the Green Belt Movement, an environmental non-governmental organization focused on the planting of trees, environmental conservation, and women's rights. In 2004, received the Nobel Peace Prize for "her contribution to sustainable development, democracy and peace".



BUCHI EMECHETA: Born in Lagos, Nigeria, in 1944, Emecheta's life and work has, in effect, set the stage for a new generation of west African female writers. Like Chinua Achebe and Adichie, Emecheta has provided a fictional exploration of the Biafran War in Destination Biafra (1982).



CHIMAMANDA NGOZI ADICHIE: Born in Enugu, Nigeria, in 1977, Adichie has received popular and critical acclaim since the publication of her first novel, Purple Hibiscus, in 2003. With the publication of Half of a Yellow Sun in 2006, for instance, she explored the Biafran War that was so central to Achebe's literary project, among many others.

FLORENCE NWANZURUAHU NKIRU NWAPA (13 January 1931 – 16 October 1993): Nigerian author best known as Flora Nwapa, mother of modern African literature. Best known for recreating life and traditions from an Igbo woman's viewpoint. Nwapa also is known for her governmental work in reconstruction after the Biafran War. In particular she worked with orphans and refugees who were displaced during the war.



MARIAMA BÂ. Born in Dakar, Senegal, in 1929, Bâ has come to be regarded as one of the most original writers to have emerged from west Africa. Her life and work were preoccupied with issues such as gender relations, power and inequality, as well as the ways in which these were framed and affected by African and Islamic cultural beliefs. She died before her second novel, Scarlet Song (1986), was published.
